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# Europe is a beautiful project

- 1. Peace and prosperity brought after WWII –  
Free Trade Zone (= large domestic market)  
– No borders for people and goods**
- 2. Facilitating the economy:**
  - Common norms and standards • Euro
  - Combating trust formation • Creation  
of a European innovation area • ESA

## Challenges

- Rapid expansion, perhaps too fast or not quite?
  - No real choice (Eastern Europe)
- Ageing & economic stagnation – High  
unemployment and inactivity •
- Globalization, energy, raw materials •
- Immigration •
- Clumsy and expensive government  
structures • Still a political lightweight on a global level •
- The “European” citizen does not exist: –  
Democratic challenge.

# There's more to it than that

**Proposition:** There are too many unemployed people because the

**The economy is stagnating. The economy is stagnating because democracy is failing. Democracy is failing because its moral foundation has been undermined.**

- **The Lisbon process demonstrates this**
- **Democratic should be:**
  - **Feedback, bottom-up**
  - **Broad consultation and mature deliberation**
  - **Well-considered decisions**
  - **Only the framework, impose as little implementation as possible**

## Democratic functioning of Europe?

- **Commission not elected, but appointed**
- **80% of national legislation is a result of European decrees: sovereignty?**
- **Very detailed regulations, technically very demanding**
- **Growing influence of industrial lobbies**
- **Lisbon Treaty first sold as “Constitution” unreadable document 600 pages**
- **De facto creation of VSEU (Union vs. Community). OK, but why through a back door?**
- **After rejection (consensus legally required) repackaged as a hodgepodge of amendments to existing treaties, just as unreadable.**

# Treaty of Lisbon

- **Certainly contains good elements, but...**
- **Formal requirements:**
  - **Readable and well-defined?**
- **Content requirements:**
  - **Set the framework, unambiguously?**
    - **typical text: Article 311 is deleted. A**  
**Article 311a is inserted with the text of paragraph 2, first subparagraph; and paragraphs 3 to 6 of Article 299 are amended as follows: ...**
- **Functional requirements:**
  - **Adapted to the purpose?**
    - **democracy is a bottom-up process, not a treaty of amendments in legal speak**
- **Legal requirements: consensus? (=27x YES)**
  - **Can therefore no longer be ratified at European level level**

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## Extensive but vague powers

- **E.g.: “The Member States shall coordinate their economic and employment policy in accordance with detailed rules laid down in this Treaty, which the Union shall have competence to provide.”**
  - **The Union imposes and the (small) Member States are sidelined**
  - **Will this be a harmonization policy downwards or upwards?**
  - **Isn't this exactly the reason why Belgium is no longer works?**

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## **Anti-democratic attitude and reaction of European media and top politicians**

- **Before the Irish referendum:**
  - Only government support for Yes camp
  - Intimidation and threats
- **After the referendum (54% = no):**
  - Gross insults to the Irish people
  - Threats
  - Lying campaigns (ingratitude, role of European subsidies)
- **Yet 73% of Irish people are in favour of Europe**
  - One of the best scores (avg.EU = 52%)

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## **Should you just push through anyway?**

- **Most European governments have referendums removed for fear of a “No”: democratic?**
- **The rest rushes ratification through Parliament**
- **Irish are being pushed towards a second referendum: is the second no then legitimate?**
- **What if a large country had voted negatively?**
- **Commission urges swift ratification by national or regional parliaments: – Does this prove that the Treaty/Constitution has been ratified by the European citizen is worn?**
  - Damage to the European idea caused by reactions after the referendum is very great

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# Quid Belgium?

- **Treaty is with the Belgian federal state**
  - Not with the regions
  - Legitimacy of Belgian federal level is faltering
  - Can Flanders chart its own course?
- **However:**
  - The solution for Belgium is a confederal state within a confederal Europe
  - Cf. Switzerland
  - Also a solution for Europe:
    - Only way to work with 27+ heterogeneous Member States in a democratic way

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## Long-term vision

- **Or a bad and illegitimate treaty?**
  - Imposed unilaterally

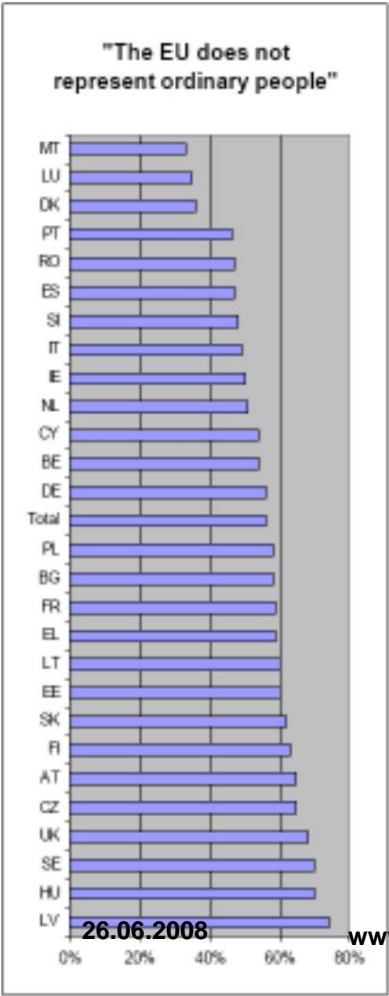
What if support completely disappears within 10 years? The risk of disintegration is very high.
- **Either build (and earn) democratic legitimacy instead of a treaty**
  - This can give Europe a solid foundation
  - Lasting democratic integration
  - Lasting prosperity

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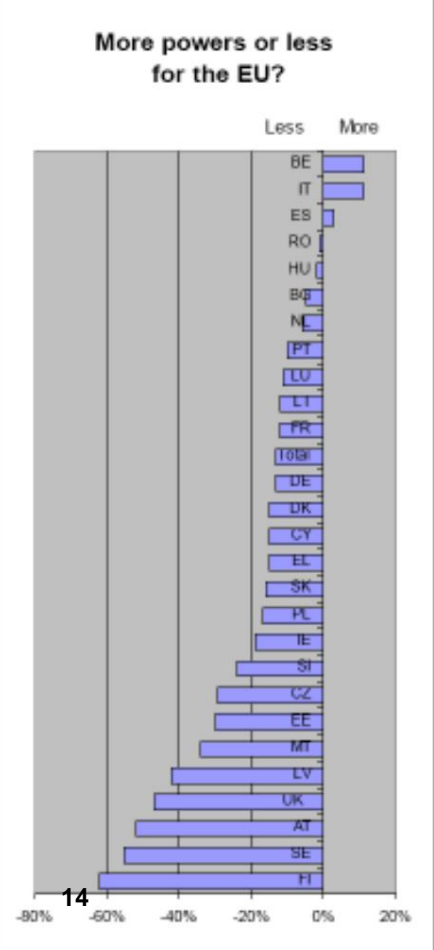
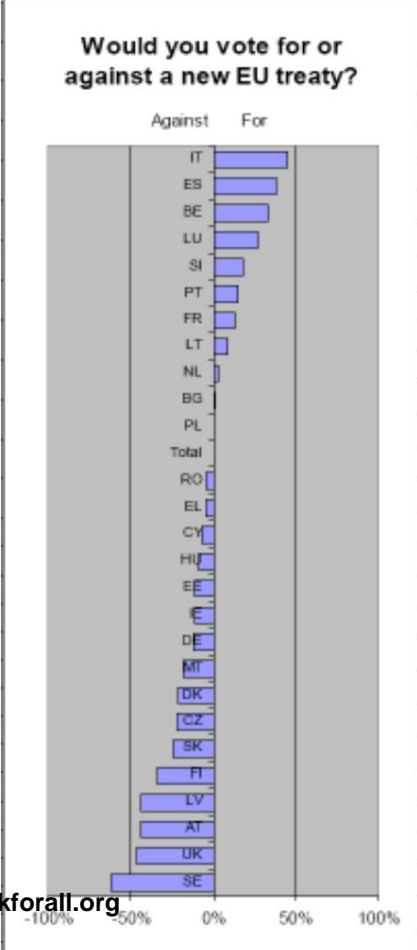
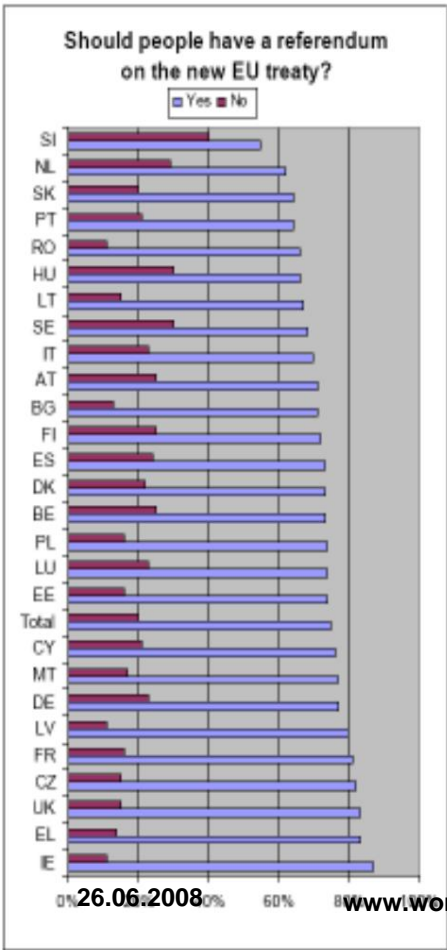
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**Poll on the future of Europe (OpenEurope):**

# What needs to happen now?

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## Decide today

- According to current European law, the current treaty can no longer be ratified
- No tricks can save this (already second (trying))
- The treaty is substantively, formally and legally defective
- Better not approve
  - Countervailing power and insight of a regional minority: democratic
- But working towards a democratic Europe
  - Example is Switzerland, confederal
  - Strongly decentralized, strong subsidiarity
  - High prosperity
- Short-term power vs. long-term freedom

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# Possible roadmap

- **First resolve consensus blocking**
  - E.g.  $\frac{3}{4}$  majority + second round with consultation if a Member State has serious objections
- **Then draw up a minimal constitution of the USEU, to be approved by national referendums**
- **Continuous information exchange and citizen involvement. Direct democracy instead of... Representative democracy**
- **Gradually expand the Constitution by subject with strict application of the subsidiarity principle (bottom-up)**
- **Reducing the influence of EEG legislation**
